ne of the services involved a group from <u>Logos Ministries</u> <u>International</u> based in Belfast, with Philip Lewis and his Indonesian wife Rita working as Cross-Cultural Missionaries as well as with local Christian islanders working across South East Asia.

Among the workers they are involved with in the islands of South East Asia is Pastor Minguss and his wife Linda and other Christians. They work with the 16,000 Baduy tribe including involvement with a medical clinic. The Christian village of the Rimba tribe has just had the N.T. translated into their language and also have an audio Bible translation of Luke's Gospel.



Outreach ministry involves working with many drug offenders that are meeting Jesus in prison. Refugee discipleship and school work involves working with many Chinese children.

We were particularly pleased to meet Pastor Minguss and his wife Linda from the same island that Eileen's sister Ailish worked in for many years. They were impressed with Eileen's pronunciation of island place names – "Just like we would say them!" and that Eileen loved the music played on angklungs. The smiling Pastor was a splendid guitarist and played all the music of hymns for us to sing along to. It was the

first time we had heard hymns being sung by them in their own language. He also gave a short epilogue in perfect English on Romans 1 v 1-7.

Our second Sunday lunch with Billy and Agnes was also an early celebration of Peter's birthday with the obligatory birthday cake and of course candles!

The absence of light pollution provides unparalleled views of stars, the moon, and planets.

Ceoldán is at the entrance to the OM Dark Sky Park and Observatory with two telescopes, nestled within Davagh Forest. We think Roger Horne would really be interested in exploring the area.

Ceoldan is made mainly out of recycled pallets. The blue figure standing by the giant's thigh is Eileen. It gives you some idea how big the giant is.

Embrace a Giant Spirit



The last mission speaker we want to tell you about is the geologist Mark Collier and his <u>Friends in Action International Northern</u> <u>Ireland</u> organisation of 25 years that drills wells in Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast and Ghana. Mark came with his wife Louise, who was working with New Tribes Mission in West Africa when Mark first visited the area, met and fell in love with her!

Friends in Action International NI (FIAINI) has been involved in a well drilling ministry in Burkina Faso, West Africa since 2004 and have, since that time, been drilling wells on behalf of mission groups such as Serving In Mission and Tear Fund. Volunteers support full time highly trained well drilling operators and are required to undergo training before being authorised by the group to travel to Burkina Faso and now also the Ivory Coast and Ghana to serve on well drilling teams. A large number of wells/water-towers have been drilled to support school buildings and so in this way enabling the advancement of education by ensuring there is fresh water for students and

teachers. Most people in Burkina Faso suffer from diarrhoea or other intestinal diseases brought on by drinking dirty infected water. Most local people take water from open wells from which animals drink from and urinate into. For villages with safe drinking water from wells/water-towers drilled hundreds of feet into the ground noticibly improves the general health of the people. **FIAINI** continues to seek to serve God by bringing a cup of clean water to needy men and woman.

As much as 50% of wells that were bored by other organisations in remote villages across West Africa are not working because there is no ownership of the wells and no maintenance and financing of the wells'

upkeep. Within the communities where **FIAINI** supplies water there is also access to skillfuly trained technicians who can maintain and repair



the wells, pumps and water points that **The Mellon The Triends In Action they provide. FIAINI also provides training

for pastors, evangelists and church leaders many of whom maintain the water points and at the same time use the opportunity to share the Gospel with the communities that are often difficult to reach. Most of the practical training is carried out in a field based training site in the Ivory Coast.

There is a lot more I could tell you about this wonderful work but it wll have to be at another time. Enough to say we did feel the FIAINI is doing a very important work in those three countries in West Africa.

e were invited to Tom and Ruth's home for an evening meal with Billy and Agnes on our last whole evening in Ireland. We had massive hugs from Tom and Ruth when we arrived and also when we said goodbye. This was another lovely meal that was for us a Celebration of the Joy of Answered Prayer. Our friend Tom is someone we have prayed for over the years since the start of Covid. Tom was desperately ill with Covid right from the start of the pandemic and was one

of the illest people in N Ireland for a prolonged period of time. Although he has had many setbacks, he is enjoying life and thanking the Lord for the life he has.

To use Tom's own words -"Give God all the praise and thanksgivings".
