I wonder if you can remember some special moments in your life that you hold on to and retain in your memory.

Peter and I returned to Ballintoy in Northern Ireland, for two weeks in October and as we arrived at the cottage right down by the beach, we saw a sight that we had never seen before. Hundreds of gulls were on the calm section of sea in front of us making a significant noise. As an incoming wave was about to crash down on them, they flew straight up in the air and settled down on the other side of the breaking wave. The light caught their feathers and on showing the photo to a friend they thought they looked like the angels we hang in church for Advent!



Pastor Billy gave us an enthusiastic welcome to the Harvest Festival Drive-in Service on the first Sunday in Dunseverick Baptist Church car

park. The area is very much a farming community. As Billy said to us over a lovely evening meal prepared by Agnes, his wife at their home, you have to know the difference between green, blue, red and yellow in order to communicate



effectively with the farmers! Why? Because green is the colour for the John Deere tractors and farm machinery; Blue - New Holland; Red - Massey Ferguson and Yellow - JCB. Farmers do like to talk about their tractors and if you want to get to know the farmers you have to get to know their tractors first!



One afternoon we went with Billy and Agnes to a garden centre café to meet up with Tom and Ruth Sampson. Can you remember our church was praying for Tom who was very ill with covid last year?

Tom and Ruth gave us big hugs when we met them and Tom was very keen to tell us about his health progress since we saw him a year ago.

In fact, he just wanted to talk and talk and talk about his progress; for all the help he had received and how thankful he was to God and people praying for him — including our church.



His rehabilitation courses have gone very well enabling him to renew his strength and there was a possibility he was going to be sent on another two-week course to Scotland for further training. Tom was only one of two men that completed an advanced rehab. course out of twenty. He was encouraging one man to walk and that man told Tom that it wasn't important to walk again because he had an electric wheel chair, a car specially adapted for him to drive and other aids to daily

living so he was much better off than he had ever been in his life! Tom does do administrative police work from home and hopes that he will be able to return to his previous work to some degree in the future.

Our friends also asked about the progress of Richard (Phil and Debbie's friend) who they and we have been praying for over the last eighteen months.

One of the things Pastor Billy said to us was how lovely it was to meet with friends over a meal and just have a good wee chat. It has been something they have been unable to do for such a long time.

Another journey we were able to make this year was into Co. Donegall. Last year the border was closed because of Covid restrictions on travel.

We walked the Amazing Grace Trail by the beautiful Lough Swilly.





We found some interesting notices and insect boxes along the way.





There is a lot more I could go on about but I won't! When we left our cottage for the last time on Saturday before getting the ferry back to Cairnryan we made our last call on Billy and Agnes and shared a very big cooked breakfast with them. It was a brilliant end to our holiday.

Patrick Reyntiens, working from designs by the painter John Piper, produce both the huge spectacular 84-foot-high window, with 198 glass panels, for the Baptistry Window in Coventry Cathedral, commonly named the Nutmeg Grater.

He also made the lantern tower windows in the "Wigwam" R. C. Cathedral of Liverpool, described by Patrick as an upside-down rubbish bin!

Patrick Reyntiens died on 25th October this year.

Single-use plastic

Single-use plastics are goods that are made primarily from fossil fuel—based chemicals (petrochemicals) and are meant to be used only once, for a short period of time or disposed of right after use, often in mere minutes. Single-use plastics are most commonly used for packaging and service ware, such as bottles, wrappers, straws, and bags.

Derbyshire is working to cut the waste created by single use plastic which is part of the drive to reduce carbon emissions.

How can we help?

1. Recognise and avoid buying and using single-use plastics.



- 2. Look for more sustainable alternatives
- 3. Visit Day Zero shop in Buxton for ideas on how to do 1 and 2, they are so helpful and informative and no pressure to buy

No, I'm not on commission!

What have I done / or are trying to do to help?

- I've cutdown on clingfilm and use the bags inside breakfast cereal boxes and keep cleaning them to use again and again.
 They are great to cover food and wrap things up in.
- 2. I buy as much as I can in glass and refill it eg olive oil and rapeseed oil glass jars are refilled. Cleaning products and hair products can be done this way.
- I buy loose leaf tea due to the plastic in tea bags and use the following handy tea strainer.

- 4. I use a wooden and coconut tooth brush rather than a plastic one *Christmas present ideas?*
- 5. I get my burgers from the butchers and take my own re-usable plastic containers to put them in rather than the single-use plastic tray the burgers come on.
- 6. I've bought a long-lasting coconut pan scrub rather than the yellow and green plastic pan scrubbers.

What do you do that saves on single-use plastic?

Let's encourage each other and share ideas.
