**Embracing Spring** 

May 2025

During Palm Sunday Service we lit a big candle to celebrate three occasions. The first being for our longest serving elder of our church fellowship, namely Alison Darby's birthday. The second was to celebrate The Leprosy Mission's 151<sup>st</sup> birthday and the third was for the 80<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration of Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF).

On 3 April 2025, His Majesty King Charles unveiled MAF's latest aircraft to an excited audience at MAF's special 80th anniversary event at RAF Northolt.

Thanks to the generosity of a UK based charitable trust, MAF's latest plane will serve the remotest communities of Papua New Guinea (PNG) – a commonwealth country where the charity has been operating since 1951.



It was a double celebration given that PNG marks 50 years of independence this year.

MAF pilot Joseph Tua has worked in PNG since 2019 where MAF has its largest programme. Joseph, who will fly the new aircraft to serve his own people, proudly wore his country's ceremonial face paint for the occasion. (Sorry I can't show you a picture of it but the makeup



was impressive!) He was particularly excited to meet the King – a fellow pilot who had learnt to fly with the Royal Air Force:

"To be invited to the UK for the commissioning ceremony of MAFs newest aircraft and to meet the Kina is insane!

This is a similar photo to how Joseph looked like. https://stuckincustoms.com/2015/12/05/people-of-papua-new-guinea-part-12/ MAF carries everything from patients to tons of coffee, sweet potatoes, peanuts and oranges. This new aircraft will help us do a lot more.

I never dreamed this amazing thing could happen to me. To be a part of this ceremony means everything. I am eternally grateful."

Following the commissioning of the aircraft, the RAF's Chaplain in Chief, who is Honorary Chaplain to the King – declared a short blessing over the new Cessna.

As many of you know I enjoy reading the obituaries in my national newspaper. Today had the obituary of Squadron Leader Jack Hemmings. Who was he you might well ask. He was, together with Stuart King, the founder of Mission Aviation Fellowship and who died on 24<sup>th</sup> January this year at the age of 103!

Jack Hemmings, who has described MAF as "the Good Samaritan of the skies", established the Christian mission along with his late friend and fellow pilot Stuart King in 1945. It is the worlds largest humanitarian air service.

During the second World War Jack

flew Lockheed Hudson and Douglas Dakota aircraft with 353 Squadron; which was tasked with maritime patrol and transport duties in South East Asia.

After the war, Jack flew a Miles Gemini twin engine light aircraft in 1948 when he and Stuart King, an RAF D-Day veteran, headed for Nairobi to assess the humanitarian needs of people in isolated villages

across Kenya, Uganda, Sudan, Ethiopia, Rwanda and the Belgium Congo.

The journey lasted six months during which they faced difficult terrain, adverse weather, and many logistical problems. On arrival in remote settlements the men were usually met with total bewilderment. Most folk had never seen an aircraft flying, let alone landing in their village! Liaising with local missions, the men compiled reports on what humanitarian aid they could offer and the possibility of building airstrips and hospitals in areas most remote. They covered over 7,000 miles visiting more than 100 outposts.

MAF's formative period in the years that followed, he once observed, was shaped by a group of Christian pilots who "were all of one mind; namely that wartime had given us a skill that we wanted to offer to God. There was much prayer."

MAF is the worlds' largest humanitarian air service.

Speaking of their legacy months before he died, Jack said: "Today, one cannot count the number of people whose lives have been enriched by MAF's services."

He added: "Seeing aircraft used as weapons of war – as we did as young RAF airmen – reminds me of MAF's initial purpose: to use light aircraft to bring peace and hope to needy places."

Today the Mission has 123 aircraft around the world. "Every flight does some good. I like to think that MAF is like the Good Samaritan of the air." Jack said. Imagine if your community had no roads and little access to the outside world. How would you or your family reach a

doctor if you were sick or injured? How would you receive an education or access job opportunities? This is the reality for millions of people. Jungles, mountains, swamps, insecurity and dilapidated infrastructure are all barriers to receiving physical and spiritual care and a hope for the future.



Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) is a Christian mission organisation that uses planes to overcome these barriers. Their pilots and personnel deliver relief workers, doctors, pastors, school books,

food, medicines – everything that can only be safely and speedily transported by air. Supporters give and pray to make this all possible.

With an MAF aircraft taking off or landing every six minutes, the need

is huge.



In the distance, Valentia Island. It is linked to the mainland by the Maurice O'Neill Memorial Bridge at Portmagee. There is also a car ferry to get to the island.

The English name 'Valentia' or 'Valencia' Island does not come from the Spanish city of Valencia. Instead, it comes from the Irish name of Valentia Harbour, cuan Bhéil Inse, "harbour-mouth of the island"



### **Skellig Michael Islands**

The larger of the two is known as Great Skellig, and is famous for an early Christian monastery with the incredible intact clocháns; dry-stone round beehive huts with corbel roofs. The Gaelic monastery, was founded between the 6th and 8th centuries.

It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

For the film enthusiasts, Star Wars: The Force Awakens (2015) and Star Wars: The Last Jedi (2017) were filmed on the island.



Why, you may ask is a Charlie Chaplin statue in Waterville? Charlie Chaplin first and his family visited Waterville in 1959 after his friend Walt Disney recommended the area as a good place for fly fishing. The Chaplins were so enamored with Waterville and the surrounding area that they came back year after year for over 10 years and developed close friendships with some of the locals. The Charlie Chaplin Comedy Festival takes place in Waterville every year during the month of August. The festival celebrates the life and works of Charlie Chaplin with film screenings, workshops, competitions and comedy performances.









The Gap of Dunloe was formed 25,000 years ago during Ireland's last ice age as a result of a "glacial breach" where a glacier in the *Black Valley*, estimated to be over 500 metres deep, broke through the *Head of the Gap* and moved northwards carving out a U-shaped valley.

The pass runs north—south between the Old Red Sandstone Mountain ranges of the MacGillycuddy's Reeks and the Purple Mountain Group. The highest point at the *Head of the Gap* is at 241 metres (791 feet), Within The Gap are five lakes and are connected by the River Loe.

The origins of the name Black Valley are not entirely known. Some have suggested that the name comes from the fact that this part of Ireland was one of the last to be connected to the national electricity grid, only achieving this as late as the 1970s!
